

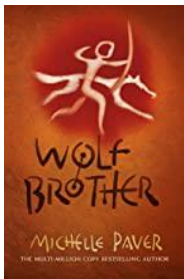
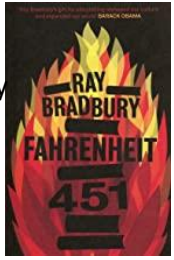
Reading Recommendations

Michelle Paver's **Wolf Brother** series is a brilliant prehistoric fantasy saga, or read anything by Michael Morpurgo.

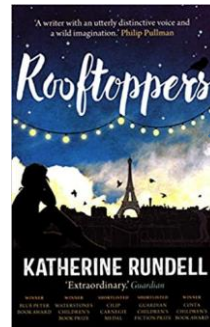


Inkling by Kenneth Oppel
